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Advent – A Time to Prepare Most Rev. Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop

As we now enter into this Advent season, the beginning of a new liturgical year, we have a wonderful opportunity to turn over a new leaf in our spiritual and religious life. During this past year within our Future Direction program we have all been charged to accomplish five themes for ourselves and our parishes. Advent allows us to take up these goals anew.

One aspect of this program for the Church is for each of us, both individually and together as parish communities, to take seriously "increased spirituality." This Advent season, as a season to prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ, is one in which we can daily put spiritual practices into our life that will allow us to grow closer to Jesus and therefore to be prepared for His coming.

St. Paul speaks to this reality in his letter to the Romans that we read on the first Sunday of this Advent season. St. Paul tells the inhabitants of the city of Rome and us as well: "You know the time in which we are living. It is now the hour for you to wake from sleep, for our salvation is closer than when we first accepted the faith. The night is far spent; the day draws near. Let us cast off deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. Let us live honorably as in daylight." (Romans 13:11-13a)

We certainly do know the times in which we are living. For all people, especially those who faithfully follow our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, there is difficulty and oftentimes ridicule. These are difficult times when much of the surrounding culture has turned away from Christian life and Christian faith.

And yet, as followers of Jesus, we also know where we stand. It is for this reason that we know that when the culture moves away from our Lord, it wanders off from the source of light and goodness. We, especially during this Advent season, know that the source of light, of holiness and of goodness, is being aligned with Jesus. And in order for us to do this we must train ourselves in spiritual practices.

Penitential seasons, like this Advent, allow us the time to accomplish this work within our lives. It certainly begins with the celebration of Holy Mass throughout this Advent season. If you have been lax in your Mass attendance, Advent is an excellent time to recommit yourselves to faithfully coming to worship God, participate in the Sacrament of Penance, and receive our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ present in Holy Communion. During these moments of prayer and worship we can begin to ask Almighty God to get us ready.

Ready for what you ask? I suppose we can begin with being ready to celebrate the birth of Jesus at His Nativity, but it is so much more as well. Since Advent is the season of expectant waiting, within it we are really getting ourselves ready for a number of things. Yes, it begins with the celebration of the Lord's birth at His Nativity, but we are also aware that Christ has promised another coming, and this one will be to judge the world.

In the Gospel for the first Sunday of Advent we read: "The coming of the Son of Man will repeat what

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happened in Noah's time. In the days before the flood people were eating and drinking, marrying and being married, right up to the day Noah entered the ark. They were totally unconcerned until the flood came and destroyed them." (Matthew 24:37-39) The word that always stands out here is "unconcerned." The season of Advent helps us to not be unconcerned and instead concern ourselves with spiritual preparation.

There are certainly too many people whose approach to their religious and spiritual life is summed up in the word, "unconcerned." So we must ask ourselves, what exactly are we to be concerned about. It is here that we seek to increase our spiritual lives. It begins with examining our daily living and how we are conforming our own lives to the life of Jesus. We have been encouraged to pray the "Prayer before Holy Mass" each and every time we come to Church on Sunday. A portion of this prayer implores God, "may the Sacraments I will receive, the prayers I will say and the hymns I will sing bring me closer to Jesus and help me to be more like Him in all that I say and do." (PNCC Prayer Book) But of course it is not enough just to say these words. We must reflect upon them in our hearts, seek to make correction through the Sacrament of Penance and Penitential Devotions and then truly amend our lives.

The Church gives us this Advent season, as a penitential period, to begin to become concerned about how we are presently living our lives and then through reflection and Penitential practices to make real changes. The goal is again said within the prayer, "bring us closer to Jesus."

We must strive to grow closer to Jesus, especially within these times of preparation, because we must acknowledge the reality that our Lord Jesus Christ is coming. Our faith tells us that He is coming in the commemoration of His Nativity; it tells us that He will one day come to judge the living and the dead as we confess within the Nicene Creed. But He also comes to us each and every time we gather for worship, each and every time we hear His word, each and every time we receive Him in Holy Communion, each and every time we serve others in His name.

Jesus is certainly coming to us in so very many ways. So the question is do we see this, and more importantly are we concerned about making these encounters a daily reality of our lives.

I certainly realize that in these weeks leading up to the Christmas holiday we will all have much preparing to do for the secular celebration. But I encourage you to concern yourselves with the spiritual preparations as well. Don't just spend time cleaning and straightening your home for the guests that will visit; clean and straighten your life in the Sacrament of Penance for the most important guest, our Lord Jesus Christ. Don't just spend time buying gifts to present to the ones you love, also spend time giving the gifts of your time, love and devotion to the One Who truly loves you in heaven, our Lord Jesus Christ. Don't just spend time and effort on the delicious meals that you will share this season, but come to share our Lord's banquet that is offered to us within the Holy Sacrifice of Mass.

All of these secular things are certainly important as we gather as family, friends and parishes in the coming weeks, but don't allow that to make you unconcerned about the spiritual aspects of your life and preparation in these weeks ahead.

I've often found that during these weeks leading up to the Nativity of our Lord, many people will ask the question, "Are you ready for Christmas?" I think that as we concern ourselves with the important aspects of preparation in this Advent time maybe the better question would be, "Are you ready for Christ Jesus?"

As we prepare in this Advent season of hope and expectation, let's be ready to meet Jesus, at His Nativity, and the judgment and each moment that He comes to us. "Are you ready for Christ Jesus?" Let this Advent season allow us to begin to answer "yes."

Sermon Preached at the Opening Mass XXVI General Synod Polish National Catholic Church October 19, 2022 Rt. Rev. Bernard J. Nowicki, DD Bishop Ordinary, Central Diocese P.N.C.C.

My brother bishops, ecumenical guests, delegates to the XXVI General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church, my dear brothers and sisters.

Good afternoon, everyone, and welcome to Saint Stanislaus Cathedral, the place where it all started, or perhaps more correctly, what ended up being our place after it all started 125 years ago in this city.

Your familiarity with the history of our beloved Church does not require me to give an extensive recounting of the details of its organization by Father Francis Hodur, except to say, that more than just the four walls of this temple, and much more than these walls and roof, our whole Polish National Catholic Church as an institution is that church

".... which for us became a treasury Pouring gifts of faith and courage"

And that's why "In it is our hope forever," just as we affirm in the second verse of the Hymn of our Church, with which you're all, again, very familiar. Let's recount some of those gifts for us that came pouring out of that blessed treasury.

First and foremost is the Church's objective "... which is the salvation and sanctification ... of people ... [That] sanctification is realized in following the guidance of the Church and in using the spiritual means which the Church receives from God through Jesus Christ our Lord ..." This description is part of the Preamble to the P.N.C.C. Constitution and Bylaws.

Another gift that came pouring out of that blessed treasury is a religious and social haven for Polish immigrants as they sought to assimilate into a foreign and hostile environment.

And that gift was followed by the freedom to express the rich Catholic heritage of liturgy and hymnody in the native tongue of these Polish immigrants. This freedom was withheld from them in the Roman Church by its bishops and clergy who were unsympathetic to this need.

Don't forget about the establishment of a robust and protective fraternal organization, Spójnia, to shield these immigrants from Roman Catholic retaliation meted out against them for aligning themselves with the P.N.C.C.: their insurance policies were summarily canceled.

And in this Church women were granted suffrage well before they gained the right to vote in secular society.

Further among those gifts pouring out of our treasury is the participation of lay people in church governance, as they collaborate with the clergy in a process of ecclesiastical democracy which is different from civil democracy. This process welcomes the laity into some of the administrative and legislative processes of the church.

I think you can readily see from my catalogue of the gifts of "faith and courage," that our Church was originally organized more for cultural and administrative reasons than doctrinal and theological goals. Those came later.

There never was any desire, at first, to leave the Roman Church except for the problem of the cultural insensitivity within that Church. If all of you were Roman Catholic today raising those same grievances from the 19th century, our church would not need to be organized today. You have only to observe the many religious and cultural accommodations accorded the Hispanic demographic within the Roman Church today to see this would be the case.

It's also evident that today our church is not the same church of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Polish immigrants today don't struggle here against a foreign and hostile environment. The need for the Polish language in our parishes has long since disappeared.

Women have the vote in this country, laymen participate in church administration, and the congregations themselves, not the bishops, are the proprietors of their parish assets.

These current facts lead us to consider the following questions: Since we're no longer burdened by these 19th century realities, then what are we about as a religious denomination? If many of those reasons that caused us to separate from the Roman Church no longer exist, then how do we understand our church's purpose today? And how do we exhibit today the same distinctiveness as a Church that we had back then because of that separation?

In order to answer these questions for myself, I had to ask myself two other questions, the ones I call my seminal questions. And they are these:

Does American Christendom need the Polish National Catholic Church?

Is American Christendom in any way diminished by the extinction of the Polish National Catholic Church

It's very possible that visitors to our parishes may not see many differences here when we're compared to the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, or the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, or the Roman Catholic Church for that matter. All these use the language of the people; they all have the laity involved in church administration. Some of them have a married clergy; and they all have excellent and sophisticated ministries that serve and meet the needs not only of their faithful but the needs of the larger communities around them.

The P.N.C.C. was once unique in seeking to serve, in the manner that it did, the spiritual, social and cultural needs of a segment of the American population that was beginning its assimilation into a new homeland, the USA.

But now, in these times, is there anything unique about our Church? Is there still a specialness of purpose, a particular mission our Church can offer others that goes beyond the confines of an ethnic enclave? Indeed, does American Christianity even need us? And is American Christianity diminished in any way if we disappear from it? Do we matter at all on the religious scene in this country or in the world?

Well, something interesting was revealed to me in the reasons I gave for answering 'yes' to those seminal questions. I came to realize I belong to a very special and unique Church of international proportions including the lands in Scandinavia. I belong to a non-papal, truly Catholic Church, and so do you. This is my testimony now before all of you delegates.

I belong to a church without an infallible bishop in Rome who claims universal jurisdiction over the whole globe and supremacy over all Christian believers on it; and despite my Polish National Catholic Church affiliation, I am still a faithful Catholic Christian in the absence of a pope. And the Roman Church itself acknowledges my Catholic pedigree, and yours, too.

I belong to a church that preserves the pristine faith and doctrine of the undivided Christian church.

I belong to a church that has received that mantel of Catholic purity which was abandoned and renounced by the Old Catholic Churches of the Union of Utrecht because of its apostasy and heresy. That Union, to which we belonged in years past, has relinquished its pride of place in the non-papal Catholic world due to its disfigured sacramentology which endorses homosexual marriages and women priests.

That Union, having deserted its Catholic purity, is now superseded and replaced by the entity to which I not only belong, but as a bishop have signed attestation to, and to which Bishop Ottar of Norway has likewise this day attested with his own signature. That entity I speak of is the amalgam of churches known as the Union of Scranton. The Union of Scranton has restored the true Old Catholic Church on this continent and abroad today.

It's a true thing that the context, the setting, for the mission of our Church has changed from the 19th century to the 21st. However, today, you, as Polish National Catholic Christians, are able to offer American Christendom a truly Catholic church which is free of the entanglements and misconceptions of the papacy; and you can offer it to any and all ethnic groups who would seek your treasured understanding of Catholic purity.


And yet, there's a similarity between where we stand now and where Bishop Hodur stood at the end of the 19th century: we, too, are on the brink of the unknown as he was. Bishop Hodur didn't know then exactly what (Continued on Page 24.)

Saints Cyril & Methodius

During November as we continue our focus of Being Eucharistic People – we reflect on Saints Cyril and Methodius "the Apostles to the Slavs."

Scripture: Mark 6:34-44



Reflection Prayer

St. Cyril and his brother St. Methodius were born in the early 9th century in what is today Greece within a devout Christian family. They both dedicated their lives to Christ within the Church living this out many different ways - including Cyril's being a professor in a University and Methodius becoming the abbot of a monastery - but they are best known for being "the Apostles to the Slavs." Called by the Holy Spirit and sent by the Church as missionaries to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the peoples of Eastern Europe, the brothers traveled to what was then called "Great Moravia" which included territories that are today part of Poland, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Hungary and Serbia. There they had great success in founding churches and training new clergy, preaching to the people, baptizing them and feeding them with the Body and Blood of the Lord. In order to translate the Scriptures - starting with the Gospels and the Psalms - and liturgical texts of the Church into the language of the Slavs, they even devised an alphabet. Although it has passed through some stages of development over the many years, is still used today in many languages.

The spiritual (and even cultural influence) of these brothers on so many of us within the Polish National Catholic Church cannot be overstated. It is as if Jesus saw so many people hungering for Him, and asked Cyril and Methodius to go and feed them on his behalf, and because they willingly and sacrificially did, the Slavic people have been encountering Christ in the proclamation of the Word and in receiving Him in the Most Holy Eucharist for over 1,150 years! St. Cyril and St. Methodius, pray for us!

Action Item

Follow the loving and courageous example of "the Apostles to the Slavs" and share your own faith with some else in this simple way: Invite them to come to Mass with you.

Praying As We Dress

In one of the more recently used weekday readings we hear St. Paul telling us about the Armor of God. You can find the passage in Ephesians 6:10-18. Those who go back aways with National Youth Convocations may remember the Armor of God as one of the Convo themes.

It is fitting (get the pun) that we dress ourselves in the Armor of God because we must be continually prepared to do battle, both against the temptations that affect us personally and the evils in the world – a culture of hopelessness, despair, and death. Putting on the Armor of God brings into our minds recognition of the fact that we belong to God, we are part of His special forces against evil.

Try this. Over the next few days, read the passage from Ephesians as you dress. Pray that God encompass you as you go about your daily activities. Know that He has wrapped you in His Armor. Think that in each moment you are taking a stand for God and God's way. Know that you are clothed by God in the very baptismal garment, the white robe, that is yours forever. Let that come across in the peace of God you offer – that thing both on the inside and outside of you – that brings others to Christ.

For clergy, we have a special set of prayers that we are to offer as we vest for Holy Mass. Fr. Jason Soltysiak did a wonderful series of YouTube videos about the stuff priests wear for Holy Mass: The Amice, Alb, Cincture, Stole, and Chasuble, plus lots of other cool information (check it out). Do all priests wear all these for Holy Mass? No, some have become sort of optional. Do all pray as they vest? Perhaps not. But, I would call to your attention the great benefit of each vestment specifically because of the prayer that goes along with them.

In wearing each vestment, we recall the Armor of God, we consider how we have fallen short (a way of examining one's conscience), and we connect to the great promise Christ's sacrifice holds for us as clergy and as the people of God.

I will not go through them all (p.s., There is a seminary course for that), but will sample a few:

The Amice is a small rectangular linen cloth that ends up tucked into your shirt or cassock collar and drapes over your shoulders. Nice side benefit – helps prevent ring-around-the-collar on your Alb and Chasuble. You place the Amice on the back of your head and slide it down praying: *Place upon my head, O Lord, the helmet of salvation so that I may be able to overcome every evil temptation*. There's the helmet from the Armor. I am reminded to not just resist temptations – and we all have our own particular ones – but to overcome them with God's help.

The Alb is the white garment priests, deacons, and even altar server's wear. Why? Because it is every Christian's right to wear the Alb. It represents our baptismal garment – the garment we will carry into and wear before the Throne of God. Putting it on we pray: Cleanse me, O Lord, from my transgressions, purify me by the blood of the Lamb and grant, that being clothed in the garment of innocence, I may enjoy everlasting happiness with You. I know I need cleansing and purification as I examine my conscience. I am reassured that Christ's sacrifice, His blood, has indeed cleansed me and will bring me to everlasting life.

The Cincture is a sort of rope or cloth belt. Putting it on we pray: Gird me, O Lord, with the belt of faith and courage and fortify me against unholy desires that could overcome me. God gives us the faith and courage we need to do battle against evil. The Armor of God helps us because otherwise we would be overcome and crushed by the Enemy.

Finally, the Stole, the symbol of priestly authority. As I draw near to Your sacred mystery, O Lord, grant that I may offer this Holy Sacrifice to Your greater glory, the benefit of Your Church and the salvation of my soul. I must be cognizant of what I am about to do and why. It is not just for me. I am encountering the sacredness of God's mystery – beyond my comprehension and doing all for God's glory, the Church (the whole capital 'C' Church – every one of us), and finally for my own salvation. I better be doing this willingly and worthily.

There are more, prayers for the Chasuble, Dalmatic (for Deacons), and even the Maniple if you are 'old-school.' There are variations on all these prayers, slightly different stylistically. That is not the important thing. What is key is that no matter what we are to do we take the time to prepare ourselves by prayer and examination. Prepared and clothed with Christ, we stand firm against the evils that assail us and our world.






waited for him and his people, just as we are untested in meeting the onslaught of threats to Christianity in these times.

Instead of defending ourselves from the Roman Church as before, today we can actually make common cause with that Church in the battle against the forces of secularism; and against the pernicious woke ideology infecting this culture, as it cancels and censors conservative people and their viewpoints, and as it teaches that when you and I stand up for the biblical truth that God created only two genders they say we're actually spreading hate speech because we're too bigoted to acknowledge there are more than just two genders today and too bigoted to use the many pronouns for them beyond 'he' and 'she'. We're also struggling with materialism, with egocentrism and the abandonment of Godly values.

For these reasons you, delegates to this 26th quadrennial, in the face of this antichristian onslaught, must lead your respective parochial constituencies in proclaiming our Church's existence broadly throughout the land, even if such a proclamation comes at great personal cost and much sacrifice to yourselves. And if it does come to that, just remember your great grandparents also paid dearly and made great sacrifices, like mortgaging their homes, to establish this Church in the first place.

All of you with your parishes back home, must proclaim across the land the uniqueness of your Polish National Catholic Church for the sake of Jesus Christ, who is present to everyone in his sacraments; for the sake of God's Christ and our Lord, who suffered, died and was raised from the dead that we might be saved: saved for the purposes of almighty God, and saved from the pain of separation from God in hell.

Truly, ours is that church
".... which for us became a treasury
Pouring [out] gifts of faith and courage:
In it [will be] our hope for the 21st century and forever."
So let's share it with everyone – in many, many Spirit-filled ways.
