The Day of Pentecost Most Rev. Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop

As a closing to the Easter season, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Pentecost, the Descent of the Holy Spirit. Following the ascension of our Lord, on Ascension Thursday, Jesus told the apostles to wait for the Holy Spirit. "While staying with them, [Jesus] ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. 'This,' He said, 'is what you have heard from Me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now." (Acts 1:4-5)

In this time of waiting the Apostles were in prayer for nine days, when suddenly something quite astounding happened on the day of Pentecost. "When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability." (Acts 2:1-4)

As we contemplate the events of this day within Scripture, we must concern ourselves with how these events are lived out in the Church at the present moment. First and foremost, we must realize that "Pentecost" as a feast was already known to the ancient Jews. It was one of the three main pilgrimage feasts of the year and it occurred fifty days after

Passover. In part this explains why in the reading from the Book of Acts, there are so many individuals in Jerusalem.

The feast originally began as the first fruits offering of the wheat harvest, but later spiritual aspects were also added. Occurring as it does seven weeks after the Passover, this feast day is commemorated as the time in which the people of Israel, after leaving Egypt following the Passover, received the books of the law on Mount Sinai. It is this aspect that we must keep in mind as we reflect on the meaning of Pentecost for us today and also exactly what happened following the descent of the Spirit.

We read further in the Book of Acts, "Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, 'Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs – in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." (Acts 2:5-11)

In reflecting on this passage, we see that the Gospel, the good news of Jesus Christ, is meant for all people. Devout Jews from every nation are gathered to hear the preaching of the Apostles. And yet even more than that, there are visitors from Rome, there are others as well, Cretans and Arabs. So, the proclaimed message that our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ died and was raised from the dead is not for the Jews alone, but is directed to all people. Secondly and a little less obviously from the reading, the message is to go forth in all directions of the world. If we look at a map with Jerusalem at the center, then the cities listed are those from every direction around Jerusalem. This shows us that the gospel of Jesus Christ is meant to be carried out from Jerusalem, that central site of the death and resurrection of Jesus, to the rest of the world in every direction.

A second point is that the apostles are to bring the message to every person in their own language. Although this occurred as a miracle on this first feast of Pentecost, this is something that we need to be a part of in different ways today. Our Constitution speaks to this in the Preamble. In speaking of a 'national Church' it states: "If our people have any mission in the solution of humanity's greatest problems, then they must also have a faith which will bear an imprint of their character, a national Church, as all creative nations had in the past and have today. Our Polish National Catholic Church in these self-determining endeavors is the first step in the life of our people and, God granting, in the life of all people in the future."

Another aspect that we must be concerned with is a slightly different interpretation of the word 'language.' As we seek to spread the Gospel and preach the message concerning "God's deeds of power," we must do so being sensitive to those to whom the message is directed. We must speak their language and continuously invite them in to partake of our fellowship. While we certainly set for all people a high moral standard in how we are to live as followers of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, we must also preach the message that forgiveness is available for those who sincerely seek God and the doors of the Church are open to those who desire to know Christ in a better and closer way.

In this feast of Pentecost, we are also reminded that now, because the Holy Spirit has descended upon the Church and upon each of us, we have a more immediate and closer relationship to Almighty God through the Spirit. And this realization is connected to the giving of the Law that is celebrated on Pentecost. The prophet Jeremiah speaks to this in his description of the new covenant. The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt – a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people." (Jeremiah 31:31-33)

Now because of the descent of the Holy Spirit, God's law, God's way, lives within us. Certainly this does not happen only in one moment, but it is a growing in the presence and knowledge of God within us. It begins in our baptism; it is strengthened in the Sacrament of Confirmation; it is nourished each and every time we receive Holy Communion; it is expressed in the work that we do building up the kingdom of God. In all this we take up the work that was begun by the Apostles on that first Pentecost as we continue to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ, the mighty deeds of God, to all around us.

My brothers and sisters, as we celebrate the Solemnity of Pentecost, not only for one Sunday, but for many weeks to come, let us all live strongly in the presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives. Let us ask God the Father to continue to send the Holy Spirit and His seven gifts: Wisdom, Understanding, Knowledge, Counsel, Strength, Godliness and Fear of the Lord. And let us go forth into our lives and into our world using these gifts to announce to all people the saving message of Jesus Christ, continually seeking to build His kingdom here on earth.

Come, Holy Spirit.

Support for the Youth of the Church

Introduction

As we continue with our reflections for the Future Direction Program of the Polish National Catholic Church, this month we reflect on the presentation of the National United Youth Association delegate to the entire XXVI General Synod. As the youngest delegate at the Synod, Jorge Hernandez Arjona inspired all the delegates with his passion and vision for the great things that can be accomplished by and for the youth of the Church. The Synod delegates included the youth within the Synodal Resolution, to encourage and remind the delegates and the entire Church of the important role of the youth within the Church at every moment.

Scripture

1 Timothy 4:10-13 - "For to this end we toil and struggle, because we have our hope set on the living God, Who is the Savior of all people, especially of those who believe. These are the things you must insist on and teach. Let no one despise your youth, but set the believers an example in speech and conduct, in love, in faith, in purity. Until I arrive, give attention to the public reading of Scripture, to exhorting, to teaching."

Reflection

In recent years, when we gather together for Holy Synod, we hear a report from the National United Youth Association, usually by its president. At the XXVI General Synod in October of 2022, President Jorge Hernandez Arjona, from St. Francis of Assisi Parish in Denver, CO gave a rousing and challenging presentation to all of the Synod delegates. The final resolution of the Synod described this speech as "impassioned and enthusiastic," and it certainly was so.

The Synod Resolution, as a response to this presentation, states that we, as the Synod delegates and more largely as the entire Polish National Catholic Church, will "pledge our support to National United Youth endeavors, and are zealously committed to work for the growth or establishment of youth groups within our parishes, and for increased attendance at the biennial National Youth Convocation."

To this end the Synod body also took the concrete step to form a National Youth Commission, as a special Commission within the Church, which will serve at least until the next Synod. It is my hope that we can make this a Constitutional Commission which will allow it to be a standing Commission of the Church, active each and every year. This Commission is not made up of young members of the Church, but rather of adults who will help and facilitate events and activities for the youth of the Church. It willit also help to facilitate and encourage participation in the national and diocesan youth events.

This work is vital to the Church for several reasons. First, the youth of the Church suffered greatly during the recent time of pandemic. Many became disconnected from the Church, especially as the youth programs were halted. A second reason is connected to the quote from the First Letter to Timothy above. The youth of the Church are often ones that have a great passion and enthusiasm for the ways of the Church and the things of Christ. In the Letter, St. Paul calls the young Timothy to be an example in both speech and action. If we desire our youth to continue in this way, we must then step up and be examples ourselves.

What is needed by the youth of our Church, and possibly it may be needed by us all, is a good example, support and encouragement. The Church has many programs for the youth: Diocesan Youth Retreats, Acolyte Retreats, the National YMS of R Kurs Encampment and the biennial Youth Convo. Along with these there are also countless ways that the youth can get involved within their own parishes and communities, if only we give a bit of direction, help and encouragement. If I must give away a little secret as well, if anyone attends these events, they too, along with the youth, will be spiritually uplifted and they will also be given a great example of passion and desire to serve the Lord and His holy Church.

Action Item

As we reflect on the role of the youth within our Holy Church, each parish should find ways to be in support of the youth programs of the entire Church and each Diocese. Plans must be made to get the young members of the Parish to these events and funds must be set aside to help them fully participate in these programs. Along

Seminarian Sean Dodd Receives Tonsure & Minor Orders at St. Stanislaus Cathedral Scranton, PA

On Saturday, April 15, Most Rev. Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop, P.N.C.C., conferred the first minor orders to Seminarian Sean Dodd during Mass at St. Stanislaus Cathedral in Scranton, PA. Assisting during the Mass were Very Rev. Zbigniew Dawid, Vice Rector Savonarola Theological Seminary, and Rev. Jim Konicki, an instructor at Savonarola Theological Seminary.

The first minor orders on the road to priesthood are: Porter - to care for God's Church, to open the physical and spiritual doors to the church and to encourage people to come to church; Reader - to read the lessons and immerse one's self in the daily readings of the Church; Blesser - to bring the blessings of God to the people; Acolyte - to serve wine and water, light candles in the church, and to bring the light of Christ to others and carry this light in everything one does, to be the light of Christ.

Cleric Sean Dodd begins his journey on the road to priesthood. The cutting of his hair, or Tonsure, is just the beginning of many years of devotion to his ministry. He will now be a catalyst for others' faith and is tasked with encouraging faith in others.

with this work, the young members of each parish should be encouraged to fully participate in every action of the parish: seek their input of the annual parish meeting, encourage them to communicate their needs to the Parish Committee and the entire Parish. As a concrete measure each parish of the Church, no matter how small should have a youth group which allows the youth to fully participate in the life of the Church.

We also encourage every member of the Church to keep the youth within their daily prayers by praying this prayer from the PNCC Prayer Book. "Loving and kind Father, because You created us in Your image and likeness and determined that one generation should follow another in order to continue life, keep in Your tender and steadfast care the youth of the Church. May they come to know and understand that true happiness can be attained when they live in harmony with Your teaching. May they, like our Lord and Savior in His youth, grow in wisdom and in years, and in divine and human favor. We ask this through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

Bishop Wiktor Wysoczański, the Prime Bishop of the Polish-Catholic Church, a professor of Old Catholic theology, former rector of the Christian Theological Academy, and participant in ecumenical dialogues with the Orthodox and Roman Catholic Churches, passed away on April 27, 2023 at the age of 84.

Bishop Wiktor Wysoczański was born in 1939 in Wysocko Wyżne (now Ukraine). He studied Old Catholic theology at the Christian Theological Academy in Warsaw (ChAT) and law at the universities in Toruń and Warsaw. He was ordained a priest in 1963. In 1975, he was appointed bishop, and eight years later he was consecrated as a bishop. In 1995, the General Synod of the Polish-Catholic Church elected him as its leader. He held this position until his death.

Bishop Wysoczański was also a professor of Old Catholic theology. He worked at the Christian Theological Academy in Warsaw from 1967. In 1982, he defended his doctorate in historical theology. In 1985, he obtained his habilitation degree, and in 2003, he was awarded the title of professor of theological sciences. Until his death, he was the head of the Old Catholic Theology Section at ChAT, as well as the head of two departments – Old Catholic Dogmatic and Moral Theology and Confessional and Canonical Law. From 1990 to 1996 and from 2002 to 2008, he was also the rector of the academy.

From 1973 to 1987, he participated in the work of the Mixed Orthodox-Old Catholic Commission. He cochaired the Working Group for Ecumenical Dialogue between the Polish-Catholic Church and the Roman Catholic Church in Poland. He was also a member of the Commission for Dialogue of the Polish Bishops' Conference and the Polish Ecumenical Council. As the head of the Polish-Catholic Church, he sat on the Presidium of the Council by virtue of his position. From 2011 to 2016, he was its vice-president.

Eternal rest grant unto him, o Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him.

May he rest in peace. Amen.



National Youth Commission (NYC) of the P.N.C.C.

The National Youth Commission is the newest commission of the Polish National Catholic Church, formed at the October 2022 Synod. Members of the commission include adults and clergy from across the P.N.C.C. as well as the Bishops of the Church, Diocesan Youth Chaplains, and the National United Youth Association Chaplain and President. The mission statement of the newly formed commission is as follows:

The PNCC National Youth Commission exists to ensure and support youth-based events and programs across our Church. We will continue to guide and encourage our youth to be involved in the Church and to live as faithful disciples of Jesus Christ.

Since its formation, the NYC has presented two events for the youth of our Church and their friends and families. In December 2022, *Make Room in Your Heart*...an Advent Youth reflection was held via Zoom, and in February 2023, a Youth Community Get-Together was presented on Zoom using Icebreakers and fun Q&A activities to help the youth meet others from across their Church. Another youth-based event is scheduled for June 22, 2023, at 7pm ET. More information about the event and how to join will be shared out over the next few weeks.
