To You is Born a Savior, Who is the Messiah, the Lord Most Rev. Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop

"In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see – I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, Who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom He favors!"

"When the angels had left them and gone to heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.' So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the Child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them." (Luke 2:8-18)

As we gather for Holy Mass on the Solemnity of the Nativity of our Lord, we will once again hear this Gospel reading from the Gospel of St. Luke. I suppose that we have heard this passage very many

times. Not only each year when we gather for Christmas Masses, but also in Christmas plays of students, on the Christmas cards we receive and many other places as well.

And yet even with all of this repetition, the story does not ever get old. It is always one that is fresh and new and speaks to us in new ways each time we hear it. I am also always moved to consider the various individuals within the story as well. There is the Holy Family certainly, but especially for us as Polish National Catholics we pay special attention to the shepherds, the ones to whom the message was addressed, the ones the angels spoke to.

These humble shepherds were out in the cold night in the fields tending their flocks. This was an important but also a thankless task. It was one that was, in many ways, unseen since these shepherds were far removed from the rest of society. And yet the Lord reaches out even to these on the fringes, to bring them to the full knowledge of the Incarnation.

The angels begin their message with "Do not be afraid." This consistent message of Scripture is announced to the shepherds, and to us as well, because we, like them, are surrounded by troublesome and difficult things in the world, fallen as it is. This is especially true when we seek to make our way in the

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world only relying on our own strength. It is for this reason that those words, "Do not be afraid," are followed by "I bring you good news" and "great joy" and the ultimate announcement that the Messiah and Lord has been born into the world.

I am also moved by the reaction of these shepherds. First, they go to manger: "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place." When the words of the Good News, the Gospel, is announced, the hearers must be drawn to place themselves in the presence of the Lord. It reminds us, my brothers and sisters, that once again the message of the birth of Christ comes to us with the call to place ourselves in the presence of Christ in the worshipping community at Holy Mass, during the hearing of the proclamation of the Gospel at Mass and especially during the reception of Holy Communion, the very presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

While they behold the Infant Christ Child, the shepherds have no words which are recorded in the Gospel of Luke, but one can imagine that they stand there in awe of this wondrous favor shown by Almighty God to His lowly people. Words failed them because they were overwhelmed by the presence of Christ, God incarnate. "So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph and the Child lying in the manger." (Luke 2:16) Words fail us still when we encounter the true presence of Christ in the Eucharist, Christ present in the proclamation of His Word and Christ present in His body, the Church, as it gathers for worship and the work of building the kingdom of God. Our desire should be the same as that of the shepherds. Since we know that Christ is present within His Church, we should have the strong desire to be present to Him there. And to receive and behold Him as did those shepherds.

Lastly the shepherds are impelled to go out and spread the good news. "When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this Child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them." (Luke 2:17) This call is still given to us today, to go out into the world and share the good news. Now of course it might not be in the same way it was done then by the shepherds. They had on their voices to tell people individually about the presence of Christ.

This way, first given us by the shepherds, might still well be the best way to spread and share what God has done. Each of us can tell those we encounter on a daily basis about the wonderful things God has done in Christ. And yet, we also have so many more ways today as well: in the charity we show through our good works and support; in the great ministry that is done within our parishes; in how we choose to live our personal lives and family lives on an every day basis. All of it announces the Good News that the Lord, the Messiah, is with His people.

Of course, this will not be an easy task. We should not expect it to be. The shepherds did not have an easier life because of this encounter, but in their sometimes difficult and arduous lives, they had a new comfort and joy in their daily living. They lived their lives in a new and joyful way as described in the First Letter of St. Peter. "Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you." (1 Peter 3:14b-15)

The hope that is in us, accompanies the faith and love what we share as well. We cherish and share the faith that in the Incarnation, our Lord Jesus Christ came to His people as a Child in Bethlehem and comes to us still in His Word and in the Eucharist. We cherish and share the love we express as brothers and sisters of Christ and because of this, the love we share with each other as well. And the hope we cherish and share is that Christ will remain in our hearts and the hearts of those we love and truly change us, remake us and strengthen us in His image.

Christ came to earth in the Incarnation that He could approach humanity. Through our drawing near to Christ in worship, in His Word and in the Eucharist, we then draw near to His divinity.

To the bishops of our Holy Church, to the priests and deacon and all the faithful, as well as our brothers and sisters throughout the Union of Scranton and the Nordic Catholic Church, I wish you all a blessed Christmas as we join in the our celebration of Christ's Nativity. My good wishes and blessings for a New Year filled with faith, joy and love in the service of our Lord.

100 Years of "God's Field"



Introduction

In this last month of 2023, we stop to acknowledge that this publication, God's Field, is celebrating 100 years of serving the Church. Although this entire year was the 101st volume of the publication, the December issue is really the beginning of the next 100 years, since the very first issue of God's Field appeared in December of 1923.

Although we honor 100 years of the publication of God's Field, printing within the Polish National Catholic Church goes back to its organization in 1897. Within a few weeks of the organization of St. Stanislaus Parish in Scranton, PA, Fr. Francis Hodur, together with others began to publish "Straż – The Guard." This newspaper spread the Catholic teaching and ideas of Fr. Hodur and the nascent Polish National Catholic Church. Of course, there were also difficulties since the paper was not owed by the Church directly, so those who published it had competing loyalties to the Church and to its owners.

In 1923, this situation was remedied when the 7th Convention of the Polish National Union resolved to purchase "Straż," and begin publishing it as the official publication of the PNU from December of that year. Along with this the Full Council of the Polish National Catholic Church at its September 1923 meeting, also resolved to began its own official publication, "Rola Boża – God's Field." This newspaper too would begin publishing in December 1923.

Scripture

1 Corinthians 3:6-9 – I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God Who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labor of each. For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building.

Luke 8:5-8, 11-15 – [Jesus said:] "A sower went out to sow his seed; and as he sowed, some fell on the path and was trampled on, and the birds of the air ate it up. Some fell on rock; and as it grew up, it withered for lack of moisture. Some fell among thorns, and the thorns grew with it and choked it. Some fell

on good soil, and when it grew, it produced a hundredfold." As He said this, He called out, "Let anyone with ears to hear listen."

[To His disciples Jesus said:] "Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God. The ones on the path are those who have heard; then the devil comes and takes away the word from their hearts, so that they may not believe and be saved. The ones on the rock are those who, when they hear the word, receive it with joy. But these have no root; they believe only for a while and in a time of testing fall away. As for what fell among thorns, these are the ones who hear; but as they go on their way they are choked by the cares and riches and pleasures of life, and their fruit does not mature. But as for that in the good soil, these are the ones who, when they hear the word, hold it fast in an honest and good heart, and bear fruit with patient endurance."

Reflection

In the above quotes from Scripture, we reflect on the parable of the sower and the image that adorned the cover of "God's Field" in one way or another for its entire time in print. Jesus, as the sower, is walking through the field scattering seeds which are His teachings, the Word of God. In the parable we know that some seed produces fruit through falling on good soil, other seed does not because the soil cannot accept it.

We see in this exactly what occurs in the publication and dissemination of our official newspaper, "God's Field." Through this publication the Church seeks to spread the message of Jesus Christ and His Holy Church far and wide. Some will embrace these teachings and through their changed lives will produce good fruit for the kingdom of God. Others may reject them entirely or dismiss them, but that does not stop the action of the sower or the mission of the Church through actions like the publication of its paper.

We notice too on the cover picture that the image is not a historical one. Jesus is not spreading the seed that is the Word of God in His own day. He is spreading it in modern times. If we look in the background of the picture we see factories, modern homes and churches. Just as in the times when our Lord walked this earth, His followers, those who accept His teachings, are God's Field as is mentioned in Paul's First letter to the Corinthians.

We must also acknowledge then that Jesus is still spreading His Word in our own lives right now, in each and every day of our individual lives and within the life of the Church. We, who are faithful members of the Church, are God's Field today. And our official publication is still with us to confirm and strengthen us as we strive to produce good fruit for the kingdom of God.

Action Item







Rekindling Love and Financial Harmony: A Report from The Taste of Oxygen Couple Workshop

The air buzzed with excitement as Womack Army Medical Center civilian and military professionals sat shoulder-to-shoulder, ready to tackle the often-challenging topic of love and money. Additionally, this workshop fostered open and honest communication, equipping military couples with effective tools to discuss financial matters constructively. This improved communication helped resolve conflicts peacefully and cultivate a more collaborative approach to finances. After the workshop, participants provided overwhelmingly positive feedback. As the deer longs for streams of water, so my soul longs for you, O God. (Psalm 42:2 [NAB])

Advent has become my favorite time of year. Eight years ago, I was at home with family in Costa Rica. Our second daughter had just been born... a new life brings many ruminations to the soul. I prayed one night for direction so I could best provide for my family and the response was not at all what I expected. I, an Evangelical at the time, dreamt about a married Bishop dressed for Advent preparing the table for the coming of our Lord. I hardly knew what to do when I awoke, but it led me to learn what a Bishop even was, with which group a real Bishop could be married, and to read about the history of the Church and theology. I found my home in the P.N.C.C.

The Church has been transformative in my life and has become a rock and source of strength for me. Advent remains my favorite season because it was Advent that the Lord used to bring me home from the confused desert of Protestantism. The joy of the expectation of the coming of our Lord continues to fill me with hope, even when my soul finds itself quite weary.

I find now that I miss the Eucharist when I stay too long away from the Lord's table. My work as a nurse often requires me to cover weekend shifts. Most notably this Advent season I have been working every weekend because a coworker who could use your prayers has been quite ill. I find myself yearning for our Lord, for the fellowship of the children of God, and for the presence of Christ in the Eucharist more now than ever before.

Advent has proven to be a season of great strengthening, a time to renew your commitment to the Lord and place everything right in your life in expectation of His coming. The seasons ebb and flow, but our Lord remains the same forever. The seasons were created for us, to guide us, to give us a path that renews our strength. Renew your strength in the Lord this Advent season and partake in the fellowship of God's people and the miracle of the Eucharist.

Christmas Message from the Bishop of the Buffalo-Pittsburgh Diocese, P.N.C.C. Rt. Rev. John Mack

They that hope in the LORD will renew their strength, they will soar on eagles' wings; They will run and not grow weary, walk and not grow faint. Isaiah 40: 31

I would imagine that nothing can bring us closer to the details of the Nativity of our Lord as the experience of having a baby due in or around Christmas. By experiencing that scenario, we know firsthand the balancing act it involves. One of our children was born on December 29th and we had a back-up plan if my wife went into labor during Christmas Eve mass. Joseph, the earthly father of Jesus, was faced with the same reality. First of all, this was a pregnancy unlike any other pregnancy in the history of the world. Joseph was tasked with explaining how his beloved Mary, the one to whom he was betrothed, was now with child. Joseph was faced with the hardest decision of his life. Should he divorce Mary quietly and avoid the scorn and condemnation of the entire community? Simply send her away until after the birth and then let her deal with it? Imagine the reaction of the men of the town when Joseph walked past. Visualize the wagging tongues of the women at the town well as they passed along this succulent piece of gossip. Even his own mother could not imagine the shame that would be heaped upon her and her family name because of this. Joseph pleaded with her saying: Mary and I never acted improperly – even after we were betrothed.

God did intervene, sending an angel to Joseph to reassure him that this was all part of God's plan. We all know the words. "Joseph, son of David; do not fear to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give Him the name Jesus, because He will save His people from their sins." We all know that the story doesn't get any easier later on. Joseph must make a long, arduous journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem to comply with the edict of Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. Upon arriving in Bethlehem, there was no housing or basic comforts. Mary, great with child, delivers the Son of God in a stable. Following the birth and upon the arrival of the Magi from Eastern lands, Joseph is warned of the plot of Herod to eliminate any threat to his throne by slaying any male child two years and younger. Joseph is warned in a dream to leave for Egypt with Mary and the child and to stay there until the danger is past.

Just a typical birth of a child you might ask? Why couldn't God the Father just work out all these difficulties and problems ahead of time instead of all this drama? He is God after all! Yet therein lies the crux of the incarnation. The Second Person of the Trinity, Jesus the Christ, leaves His throne of grace at the right hand of God. He is sent to earth in human vesture to us and for us. As a grown man He begins His ministry to redeem and save us. We, the inhabitants of God's creation that we call earth, live in a fallen world. Therefore we will all experience to a greater or lesser extent, the hardships and trials of life that we might call the *human condition*. The one and only defense we have against all these challenges is trust and belief in the sovereignty and power of Jesus Christ.

I share with you the story of another birth. My son, Andrew and wife Brianna were expecting their second child (a girl) around November 28th. Everything was going according to plan with the pregnancy. Brianna's water broke on November 14th and off to the hospital they went for the delivery. Sherry (my wife) packed her suitcase and essentials and headed for Pittsburgh. Shelby was born at 10:16 AM that day by caesarian section, as planned. She weighed almost eight pounds. Everything was fine after the delivery. About 40 hours into her young life, Shelby was experiencing some serious issues and wasn't able to keep anything down. The knowledgeable staff made the call to transfer her to Children's Hospital in downtown Pittsburgh. What an

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unexpected challenge in this young child's life. Imagine the thoughts racing through my son and daughter-inlaw's hearts and heads. Andrew set out for Children's, while Brianna stayed behind where she delivered. Within a few short hours and many tests, it was determined that Shelby had a blockage in her intestines and they would have to perform surgery to try to correct it. Andrew was at Children's hospital almost continually for the next week.

A prayer chain was called into action; I notified my priests and congregations of our pressing need and they responded immediately. A candle was lit and placed at the feet of the Blessed Mother in my cathedral for her intercession to Jesus. I tried to suppress my memories and tears from 1982 when we lost our daughter +Christine at twenty-four week's gestation. She was too small to be saved. I prayed that my son and daughter -in-law would not have to face the same outcome. Thankfully, by the grace of God, the prayers of so many and the healing hands of human physicians and ultimately the hand of the Great Physician, Shelby is now home and doing well.

Two seemingly different stories of birth but perhaps not so different in so many aspects. Joseph faced many obstacles and challenges in being faithful to Mary, to his earthly family and to God, but he endured with God's grace. My son Andrew had to draw upon all his faith and strength in his young daughter's moment of crisis. He had to be Joseph in every way imaginable. I thank God for the good and loving father that he is and hope that in some small way, I had a part in it.

Moments of crisis remind us of the fact that far too often we are guilty of taking things for granted. We keep Jesus behind glass, like a fire extinguisher, and then bring Him out when there's a problem. This Advent Season has called us to think about Jesus' return in glory; to remember that we are finite human beings and that all life is so very precious. We live in very turbulent times of mistrust, violence, anger, wars and oppression. Let us make it a point in this Season of Christ's birth to remember that Jesus, God's only Son has come as a light to the nations. It is only when His light shines through us that the darkness of the present age can be conquered.

Lastly, let us give thanks for the talents and gifts of surgeons who operate on two-day old babies, for families and friends and loved ones who bring us comfort care and love. Let us be thankful for day care workers, first responders, medical and law enforcement personnel and all who serve Jesus by serving us in our daily living.

As we gather at the manger in our homes or in our churches; as we gather for our Christmas Eve Wigilia dinner; as we share the blessed oplatek, forgiving one another and asking for forgiveness for any offences we may have caused, let us hold one another ever so tightly in the love of Jesus. May we always treasure the gift that God has sent to earth for us: Emmanuel – God with us!

Christmas Message from the Administrator of the Central Diocese, P.N.C.C. Rt. Rev. Bernard Nowicki

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus,

Without question, the overarching message of Christmas is encapsulated in the name Immanuel, *God (is) with us.* Because of the Incarnation event, God is ever close to us in his Son, Immanuel, the Christ, Jesus. There is no distance between divinity and humanity, between God and his creation. This truth of our faith is brilliantly described within a lyric poem of Saint John of Cross where he pictures God the Father speaking to the Son:

My Son, I wish to give you a bride who will love you. Because of you she will deserve to share our company, and eat bread at our table, the same bread I eat.

(Romance on the text *In the beginning was the Word*, section 3)

From this excerpt, you can see that our celebration of the birth of Jesus reveals that we are not alone nor separated from God. Instead, you and I, as his faithful ones, share in the communion of God's love now visible in the birth of our Saviour.

In the child Jesus, the humility and vulnerability of God is visible. As you can see, God comes without force or fear in order to avoid compelling us into a friendship imposed upon us. In the Babe of Bethlehem, God actually dresses himself in the frailty of our human flesh to transform us from within. Thus dressed, God addressed our need for healing from human sin and division to lead us to our home with him in paradise.

Celebrating Christmas from within this perspective will lead us more deeply into the mystery of faith.

Of course, at Christmas time, I'm aware that there can be both joys and struggles. There's the joy of celebrating with family, friends and the community of the Church. But there's also the struggles for those who are alone, separated from family or the community, and for those who have lost loved ones. Perhaps your aid to them in their struggles will be the gift that makes all the difference in their strife.

Wherever you will be this Christmastide, I fervently hope that each of you will know the truth of this Season, that God is not distant, and, that Jesus Christ is born for your good, for your salvation and the salvation of the whole world.

May every blessing of the Christ child come to you and your families this Christmas, and may the love and the joy and the peace of Christ be with you always.

In every parish and in every family we are writing out Christmas cards, enclosing Christmas wafers *oplatki* and sending them to loved ones and friends. We are running to the stores or going online to find just the right presents for the special people in our lives.

Parish committees are taking wreaths out of storage and fluffing them up for hanging in our Churches. Lines of holiday lights are being tested and then hung on Christmas trees, the exteriors of homes, rectories and churches.
